I write to you full of gratitude for the most wonderful four days of the Holy Father's visit to the UK and in particular for the unforgettable and grace-filled experience of his presence in our own diocese and in the city of Birmingham. I felt immensely honoured to welcome the Holy Father to Cofton Park on your behalf, and the priests and deacons, the religious men and women and all the lay faithful of our diocese were very much in my heart at that moment on Sunday morning as the sun began to shine.

On Sunday 26 September I will be celebrating a special Diocesan Mass of Thanksgiving for the Papal Visit and Beatification at 4pm in Holy Family Church, Coventry, to which you are all warmly invited.

The throne used by the Holy Father at Cofton Park is now at Holy Family Church and I shall use the chalice, which is Pope Benedict's gift to our diocese, for the first time during this Mass. This will give us an opportunity to come together and thank our Lord for all that we have received, and to ask for his guidance on how we may make this experience bear "fruit that will last".

Let us continue to pray for and encourage one another in these remarkable days for the Catholic Church in England & Wales, for the whole country, and, of course, for our own diocese.
